




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
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# My ethnic/racial/cultural identity is ...








## On the gender continuum I am


# The religion I was raised with is

- 17. Israel. I know I was listening while working but I expected a more lively debate, but I feel like the class was directed away from some of the more controversial aspects of this topic.


#### One Jewish practice I learned about is:
